# **Taxation Without Representation?**

The State of New Jersey is attempting to sneak yet another tax hike past the taxpayers--to the tune of \$600 million!

A bond proposal to build and fix public schools is being actively considered in both houses of the Legislature and looks poised for easy passage--even though voters won't get an opportunity to vote on it as required by the New Jersey Constitution. The \$600 million bond issue is the single largest bond proposal since one in 1975 for transportation (which the taxpayers defeated) and is larger than all four bond issues on last November's ballot.

# ASSOCIATION MEMBERSHIP DOESN'T COST — IT PAYS!

In an unprecedented maneuver, the New Jersey Education Facilities Authority (NJEFA) would for the first time ever be empowered to issue bonds for public school projects. By giving the NJEFA the power to issue bonds, the Governor and Legislature would bypass the wrath of the taxpayers over their recent tax hikes.

According to the state constitution, the legislature may not create a debt (i.e., issue bonds) without first submitting it to the voters. NJEFA bonds would be Authority debt, not State debt, even though the legislation requires that the debt service be paid for by an appropriation from the state's general revenues. Thus, the taxpayers will foot the bill even though they did not get a chance to approve it.

Further, the cost of the bonds over their 20-year repayment schedule will be substantially higher than it otherwise would have been had the state issued the bonds as they will not earn New Jersey's triple "A" bond rating. That is the bond rating Governor Florio has been touting as one of the justifications for his tax increases. Only bonds with the "full faith and credit" of the state earn a triple "A" rating; moral obligations bonds, such as NJEFA-issued bonds, receive a lesser rating. The difference between a triple "A" rating and a double "A" rating can be as much as 5 percent.

Some 50 percent of the money raised from the bonds would be guaranteed to the 30 "poorest" school districts with the state Department of Education establishing a priorities list for distribution among the remaining districts. The so-called wealthier schools will get little or none of the money.



### **HOWARD SCHOEN**

A microbiologist and Edison resident. Schoen is the Libertarian nominee for Congress in the 6th District.

Schoen, a 20-year member of the Libertarian Party, espouses the Libertarian view that less government is better government. He says that government is inept at fulfilling society's needs, that individuals and businesses can do it better themselves.

He advocates dismantling government programs for such services as education, welfare, and health care. The private sector should be responsible for these things. he says.

Schoen says he would have opposed a federal tax hike and an unbalanced budget if he had been in Congress during the recent budget fight.

The end of Prohibition should be made complete, he said, by legalizing drugs and ending the costly war to eradicate them.

He advocates cutting aid to foreign despots, and confining the American military role strictly to national defense, not to international policing.

On abortion, he is prochoice. However, he opposes taxpayer-funded abortions.



### PETER HLADIK

Hladik, of Piscataway is running for freeholder as a Libertarian Party candidate.

Hladik, a business administration major at Middlesex County College, endorses the Libertarian view that government should fulfill society's most basic needs, and not intrude in the lives of individuals.

He says that such government-provided services as education, public transportation, human services, and others ought to eventually be privatized.

Hladik has called for a 10 percent across-the-board cut. in the county budget as a starting point for deeper future spending reductions.

He says municipalities should carry out an aggressive recycling campaign as a countywide waste disposal remedy, and he invites regional siting of future waste disposal facilities.

Hladik advocates limiting terms of elected public officials, and thinks that voters ought to have the option of recalling elected leaders by referendum. His goal is to be selected chairman of the freeholder board's education and welfare committee.


