## *LP is winning the War but has loses in battles?*

There are many politically active people who think that the last election actually is a change in the direction of government towards a freer more productive society. It would be cavalier and blind not to acknowledge the enthusiasm and higher expectations of the electorate being met by an articulate and prepared Republican party, especially in the persons of Newt Gingrich, Dick Armey and Phil Gramm. They have direction, plans and the ability to execute. What does this mean for the Libertarian Party? Victory?

From my Philosophical side it signals the real, in practice, acceptance of the Libertarian philosophy. (Come on, those guys are not Libertarians, just another group of fascists and interventionists.) Well one of the first things we learn in philosophy is the motivation of the actor is irrelevant, only the consequences have importance. In other words, instead of disdainfully asking what the Republicrats have to do with us, the Pure, we must keep in mind that the remnant keeps the flame burning. It is the job, the purpose of those who believe in and understand freedom, to teach and make universal the principle idea of freedom. Ideas need to be defended constantly, consistently and actively, The Liber-

tarian Party fulfills the public activity of ideological conflict. Although the voters may think a vote for the Libertarian name a much too radical thing to do, they will bring home parts of the ideas, that only we debate in public, to the party that they do choose. Remember when they would have liked to crucify Goldwater for the unthinkable proposal of making Social Security (and the draft) voluntary. S.S. is untouchable! Now even Billy Bob wants (well he probably doesn't want to but thinks he has to) to do something to contain social security. No matter how little they do the ideas of sacred cows and reduction has been breached and will always be the subject of scrutiny. Ideological progress can take years or centuries but this is very different than winning office to control patronage and accumulate large campaign funds. This is

world peace and prosperity at stake.

I, for one, think the recent events have been a fruition of the efforts of Libertarians and other organizations carrying similar messages. Of course it is far from done and the effort will never end. An idea that is not defended because it is self evident becomes a forgotten and unused idea.

The job is still one of keeping the pressure on. The ideal of smaller government has become legitimized in this election. Libertarians can take credit for this victory. If smaller government can be legitimized over the overwhelming odds of government employees, Rostenkowskis, lobbyists, tons of cash; then our heirs can expect an election in which the discussion revolves around dissolution of the last remaining vestiges of tyranny, government.

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# A Minority View

DON'T TREAD ON ME

Without question, Americans have known unprecedented liberty. But increasingly, we're trading liberty for safety, somewhat like a caged Canary. If ignorance rather than design explains our headlong rush toward tyranny and servitude, there is hope for us. So let me share some liberty tidbits from Lysander Spooner (1808-1887), one of my early American heroes (his collection is available from Laissez-Faire Books Co.).

Spooner argued that all people are endowed with equal rights to life, liberty and property, adding that these "natural rights are inalienable and can no more be surrendered to government, which is but an association of individuals, than to a single individual." This vision inspired Spooner to write "Unconstitutionality of Slavery" and later "A Defence for Fugitive Slaves." He advanced the brilliant argument that would become known as "jury nullification" — that juries are

legally sovereign. As such, juries have the right to judge a defendant not guilty if it judges the law, even if it has been upheld by the Supreme Court, to be defective, unwarranted or wrongly applied. Thus, Spooner argued, since slavery itself was unjust, the newly enacted fugitive-slave law was unjust, and juries should exonerate all accused of violating it. Today's juries still have the common-law right of nullification, but the thugs sitting on the bench either deny or don't inform juries of that right.

Suppose you see Williams making lots of money as a gigolo? Would you have him arrested? Has a crime been committed? First, what's a crime? Spooner says, "Crimes are those acts by which one man harms the person or property of another." Prostitution is a vice, and Spooner says, "Vices are simply the errors which a man makes in his search after his own happiness." He adds, "It is a maxim of law that there can be no crime without criminal intent; that is, without the intent to invade the person or property of another."

"Hold it, Williams," you say. "Any violation of a law is a crime and warrants punishment. You're wrong. For the government to declare a vice a crime is to violate those natural-law guarantees of life, liberty and pursuit of happiness, which are enunciated in our Declaration of Independence. Spooner says only a fool or an impostor believes that he as an individual has the right to punish other men for their vices. Therefore, government cannot have a right that individuals do not have. For example, individuals don't have the right to murder and steal — and therefore cannot give government that right. Indi-

viduals do have the right to protect their property and punish violators, therefore, they can grant such a right to government.

These principles of natural law that played such an important role in the Framers' thinking about our Constitution are held in high contempt by Congress, the courts and, I'm afraid, most Americans. My deepest lifetime disappointment is the fact that black Americans share so much of this generalized contempt and eagerly advocate and participate in the attack against the principles of natural law. Blacks, more than any other Americans, should love and respect natural law and have the deepest suspicions of government. After all, the horrors of slavery and the abuses of Reconstruction and Jim Crow were rooted in disrespect for natural law.

The good news is there's a ray of hope on the horizon directly proportional to the growing arrogance of Congress. It's the emerging leave-me-alone attitude developing across the land. The Founders might have called it "Don't tread on me!"

I am a Gay New Jersey resident and registered voter and I have been exploring the possibility of becoming an active supporter of the Libertarian Party. I agreed with the way many of the issues were handled in the November issue of the newsletter, but I must say I was dismayed at A Minority View, article authored by Walter E. Williams. Evangelical Christians are not friends of the Libertarian Party or anyone who believes in individual rights. They wish to impose their rigid

bigoted values via the government on the entire country, censorship and harassment and even outright assassination are not tactics of persons who respect and tolerate others. A case in point is the "Reverend" Phelps of Kansas who along with his congregation appear at the funerals of persons who have died of AIDS and harass the grieving family members with no consideration or respect for their individual rights. Another recent example would be the physician who was murdered in Florida by another evangelical Christian. These are by no means isolated cases of a few extremist persons, they are just two incidents that caught the media's attention.

### ***Sacrifice Liberty for Security?***

When the war on drugs began, the American people applauded it. They failed to recognize that this effort was nothing more than a power grab. The government exploited the emotional issue of teenage drug use to justify the destruction of our most basic liberties. By linking drugs with crime the government duped the American people into allowing no knock search warrants, civil asset forfeiture, mandatory drug testing and incarceration of peaceful citizens.

The war on guns worked in a similar fashion. Once again, the government played on people's fears by linking guns with crime. Propaganda efforts portrayed gun owners as inherently violent people. The government exploited the emotional issue of domestic violence. Fear, distrust and intolerance prompted the sacrifice of liberty to security. The American people allowed burdensome permit requirements, mandatory registration, fingerprinting of innocent citizens, confiscatory domestic violence laws and incarceration of peaceful citizens.

A similar campaign is now under way against America's anti-abortion activists. The government's propaganda war against so-called "anti abortion fanatics," which links their peaceful protest with crime, is an awesome threat to every American's right to peaceably assemble and to freedom of speech and thought. Recent Federal legislation gives the federal government authority to jail people who attempt to hand out literature at abortion clinics. A recent US Supreme court decision allows the Federal government to prosecute anti abortion activists under the RICO laws.

Across America courts are drafting injunctions that regulate the time, place and manner of peaceful protest on public streets. They are able to get away with it because anti-abortion protesters are not very popular these days. The State of New Jersey has, once again, taken a lead in the suppression of freedom.

On December 1, 1994, the New Jersey Supreme Court ruled that Michael Lawson and a group of peaceful pickets who had done "no unlawful act" must nevertheless give the police 24 hours prior notice before they picket on the public sidewalk in front of a doctor's home. In this decision, the Supreme Court redrafted a permanent injunction against Michael Lawson, an anti-abortion picket and "all those in active concert or participation" with him, prohibiting them from picketing "at all times and on all days...in any form within 100 feet" of the residence of Dr. Elrick Murray. The injunction permits "no more than 10 persons" to picket. They may do so for only one

hour in every two week period. They must provide advance notice to the police department of the number of pickets" and "the time and duration of the intended picketing".

In the Lawson decision, the NJ Supreme court rejected traditional first amendment arguments that such injunctions are illegal prior restraints on free speech. Traditionally, the law is that an injunction against speech which is based upon the content of the speech violates the First Amendment. Traditionally, the law is that an injunction which is a prior restraint of speech cannot be issued or enforced absent a past or imminent violation of law. Lawson had done nothing illegal. The injunction only applied to people with "a particular viewpoint." These factors were acknowledged by the court but they did not matter. They did not prevent the court from upholding the government's right to limit the time, place and manner in which Lawson may peacefully express his ideas.

How was the court able to do this The New Jersey Supreme Court held that targeted residential picketing triggers the state's interest in protecting unwilling listeners. The government's "significant interest" in protecting unwilling listeners was cited as the basis for "the State's ability to control the flow of ideas into the home." Clearly, Libertarians on either side of the abortion debate should deplore these latest encroachments on our freedom.

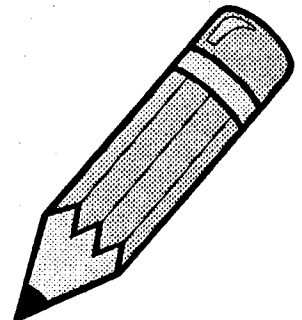

Minutes of the N.J. Libertarian Party General Meeting of November 19, 1994

The vice chairman called the meeting to order at 1:30 PM at Holy Trinity Lutheran Church, Somerset. Present: Flynn, Ellett, Stefanelli, Campbell, Grindlinger and about twenty of the membership. Absent: Layman, Muentz and Paff.

The minutes were received for acceptance by the Steering Committee. The treasurer reported that the General Fund is solvent, and that the State Fund amounts to about \$160.

Address to the General Meeting: Sam and Anna Zhadonov, who immigrated to the U.S. from Russia in 1973, told how the DEA and IRS destroyed their business. Mr. Zhadanov, a professional engineer and inventor, came to America for freedom and began working as a machinist for \$2.25 an hour. A holder of 50 Russian and (now) 9 U.S. patents he started a business in Brooklyn with one milling machine and eventually moved to a 12,500 sq. ft. building in Metuchen. In 1990 a customer asked him to design and manufacture a cheap bottle for perfume samples. He complied, and unwittingly began producing crack cocaine vials. Though the vials accounted for only 10% of his business the DEA seized all of his assets under the forfeiture law. Then the IRS demanded taxes on the property the DEA had seized. When the IRS seized his lawyer's bank account, he advised Mr. Zhadanov that the only way he could stay out of prison was to plead guilty to a conspiracy charge. He did so. The prosecutor then reneged on the plea bargain, and he was sentenced to 5 years. Now 68 years old

Mr. and Mrs. Zhadanov have borrowed some money and started a new business while he waits to be sent to prison. He says he will go on a hunger strike, and is willing to die. A Washington Post reporter spent the day with him, but the story has never been printed. Mr. Zhadanov will send Flynn a brief summary of his run-in with the government, and we shall do what we can, and urge National to follow up with the Post.

Old business

Campaign Reports:

Grindlinger, U.S. Senate. Campbell reported that Ocean county had a lot of fun working on the campaign, which raised about \$4000 and put out 1,000 signs and sent a 1,000 piece mailing to the Freedom Coalition (one person joined as a result). The campaign also ran 24 sixty second radio ads on FM 101.5, and 10 on a station in Cape May county. Karlan mentioned that he received a call from the postmaster in Cream Ridge complaining that someone was placing Grindlinger flyers in private mail boxes. Grindlinger received 13,175 votes and came in fourth behind an independent.

Heitner, Sussex County Freeholder: Pierone, the campaign manager, reported that the campaign raised \$26,000, which was more than the incumbents raised. The campaign was well run, and concentrated on getting the message out without mentioning the word libertarian. Heitner received 6,514 votes, and came in fourth in a race for two seats.

Lett, Chatham Township Committee: Stefanelli reported that Morris/Essex ran a professional campaign. As a result of the Gene Burns fund-raiser the campaign was able to

spend \$5,000 to produce a 10 minute video that was distributed to most households throughout the township. Lett came in second with 28% of the vote. What was lacking were voter ID and a get out-the-vote campaign. In an area like Chatham with 6,100 registered voters at least 50 volunteers are needed, vice the dozen or so who turned out! Lett has been approached by both the Ds and the Rs.

Bacon: U.S. 5th District. Received 2,800 votes. Derby, Cumberland county Clerk. No report.

Public Relations: Weissmann noted that county newsletter editors in Monmouth, Ocean and Somerset/Middlesex have expressed interest in the Walter Williams columns that will not be run in the NJ Libertarian; thus the NJLP should recoup most of the cost of the Williams columns. Under consideration by the PR committee are a libertarian talk radio show and a special outreach newsletter.

Fund Raising: Ellett has purchased 5,000 business reply envelopes for the fund raising appeal. Grindlinger will pursue the possibility of rebates to the party should members switch telephone companies.

Cable TV: Ron Paul's National Endowment for Liberty has promised to send us a set of their tapes when available. Ellett asked that individuals and counties which do not have access to "A Third Point of View" arrange their showing on the public access channel of their local CATV station. Call him at 908-774-3684 for a demo tape.

Convention: Campbell announced that March 4, 1995, is the date, at a location TBD. Fully Informed Jury Assoc. Ellett related that Monmouth county has distributed FIJA

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leaflets to thousands of prospective jurors over the past year. It takes very little time, only an hour from 8 to 9 on Monday mornings, the day that jurors are impaneled at the court house. Since April the group of dedicated volunteers, in teams of two, hasn't missed a Monday. Somerset has also begun to leaflet regularly. New business.

NATCOM: Ellett, who represented NJ at a meeting of regional chairs Nov. 12, reported that a regional convention of the NJ, MD, DE and PA parties is tentatively scheduled for August, 1995, in MD. He will inform the convention committee that NJ would like to see workshops offered on fund raising, recruitment and the promotion of libertarian ideas. Karlan, out NATCOM rep, will raise the following issues at the next NATCOM meeting- the printing of leaflets with the individual state's address vice the LP, the availability of packages such as Project Healthy Choice to active county parties as well as state HQ, the preparation of leaflets targeted to small business and smokers, fund raising via switching one's long distance carrier to one that will credit part of the bill to the LP, and a desktop publishing site license so that the states can upgrade their newsletter's

Voice Mail: Karlan reminded the counties to retrieve their voice messages. The problem is acute in unorganized counties which have unanswered messages dating back a year or more. He will write a notice for the newsletter on the problem!. Historian: RESOLVED, that the NJLP recognize Ray Babecki as the state historian. PASSED

unanimously,—Send material to him at 5 Evergreen Ave., Fords-NJ 08853.

Smoking ban: Pfeiffer suggested that the NJLP circulate a petition from the RJR Tobacco Co. opposing any further aggression against smokers, and ask them for funding. The Steering Committee will discuss the matter at its next meeting.

Announcements: FM 101.5 has a libertarian leaning talk show host, Dennis Malloy, whose show is on from 10 AM to noon.
