LET'S DEMYSTICIZE ECONOMICS - A LIBERTARIAN PERSPECTIVE

If an individual were to mine, smelt, and shape iron, copper, and lead ore, it might take several lifetimes to build a battery or a generator, much less a car. The efficiency of mass production and trading can create abundance. Specializing in one thing, a person can trade his or her labor for more cars, food, and other goods than he or she could ever produce. Barriers to trade reduce specialization, mass production, and efficiency.

Some say that an "unfavorable balance of trade" exists if a state gets more than it exports. The argument is that when "they" dump their goods on America at below cost, "they" get the jobs and we get unemployment. But America is getting goods and services for paper money and/or bank balances that are only good for eventually buying American goods produced by Americans. Boycotting foreign goods or setting up trade barriers again decreases specialization, and thus reduces abundance and prosperity.

Prosperity is a condition wherein goods and services are inexpensive in terms of hours of work
needed to earn them. Prosperity
allows leisure time to enjoy nature, hobbies, and so forth. It
allows, in essence, the "good
life." Politicians love to shout
"Jobs, jobs, and more jobs!" but
the bottom line is prosperity, not
jobs. More Americans have jobs than
ever before because more women are

working, but prosperity is declining. Providing every man, woman, and child with two make-work government jobs would not increase prosperity. Sixty years of full employment in Russia has created only chronic shortages of food and consumer goods.

We might wish to blame Japanese businessmen, Arab oil barons, or "capitalists" for our economic decline, but closer inspection will show an explosion of bureaucracy since World War II in the U.S., England, France, Italy, and Spain causing a decrease in prosperity despite technological advances. The "free world," like the rest of the world, no longer allows much economic freedom. Producers are licensed, regulated, taxed, subsidized, and bailed out by repressive, authoritarian bureaucracies.

The Gross National Product (GNP) supposedly reflects the amount of goods and services produced in a nation. It includes the total expenditures of consumers AND GOV-ERNMENT. Money paid to bureaucrats to formulate counterproductive regulations is valued the same as money paid to producers. And an expenditure for a nuclear missile incapable of improving living standards would be valued the same as a new soup cannery of the same price. Thus, the announced slump in the U.S. GNP is more significant when vast increases in government spending--federal, state and local--are taken into account.

Due to the tendency of special interest groups to proliferate and to accumulate power, reversing the trend toward ever larger and more intrusive governments has been historically impossible until after total collapse. Communist countries in a state of collapse now experiment with free enterprise, while the West increases controls and taxes on the private sector.

What can we do? Before we car change the situation we must understand it. This statement is presented as a basis for discussion ir an effort to understand the current

trend. Our premise is that it is natural for humans to attempt to better their condition, but that arbitrary government involvement interferes with this process; that only by severely curtailing the size and scope of government and creating a climate of freedom, can stifled human action be released in an explosion of creativity and prosperity.

Omitted are the reasons how and why governments are counterproductive, and what might constitute the proper functions of government. Also omitted are the effects of population growth, credit, crime, education, paper money, unions, wars, and other factors which may influence prosperity.

Criticism of this premise and the facts presented is encouraged.

Another family restaurant with no liquor license which is one of my favorites when I don't have a lot of handy cash is Rusty's (Rt. 28, Garwood).

Recently, I dined at Rusty's when the blackboard featured chicken murphy (or is it Chicken Murphy?). For \$5.25, which included spaghetti, salad, garlic bread and dessert, I figured, what the heck. The plate arrived with the juiciest chicken breast I've ever eaten in a restaurant (why is it that chicken breast is usually so dry?). It was covered with a peppery sauce -- green pepper, that is. Spaghetti had a marinara sauce, appropriately enough, so that the two toppings didn't clash when eaten together. Rusty's salad comes two ways -- oil-and-vinegar and plain -- and there's room for improvement there, but the garlic bread, which is heated on the same plate as the entree, is always fine. A homemade bread pudding was the dessert de jour, but sometimes a tasty rice pudding is offered.

The weekly dinner specials start on Wednesdays, but the regular menu has many interesting items on it as well. Cavatelli and broccoli for \$4.50 features al dente macaroni with broccoli, cauliflower and parsley anointed with garlic and olive oil. Baked ziti (\$4.50) and ravioli (\$4.25) are quite satisfying. A large cheese pizza is offered for \$3.50, which is a good bargain, and strombolis (sort of an inside-out pizza) go for \$3 each. Toppings (or fillings, as the case might be) cost extra.

Another place to go when low on dough is Ichabod's (Rt. 36, Sea Bright). A hot dog -- not the kind you buy in the grocer's, 10 to a pack, but a foot-long wurst with your choice of cheese sauce topping -- for \$1.75 plus a tossed salad for another \$1.75 makes a quite inexpensive, but filling, meal. Especially with the generous platter of crackers and cheddar cheese they serve you beforehand! I ordered a diet soda for \$1 (well, it's a bar, what do you expect?), making it \$4.50 for dinner that night. I hadn't cashed my paycheck, so that was about my limit.
