'INDEPENDENT' PARTIES MEET

NJLP Chair **Dr. Leonard Flynn** met with leaders of the New Jersey Conservative, Green, Natural Law, and US Taxpayer Parties on January 28, and again on February 13.

Flynn reports agreement among the participants on a host of issues related to ballot access, petition filing deadlines and signature requirements, legally-recognized party status, and election monitoring.

Campaign financing laws were also discussed. Flynn called the

others' attention to the fact that campaign spending limits are deadly to all 'alternative' parties, as a newcomer or challenger in politics -as in most fields- must spend much more than old-timers in order to get established. This fact is often overlooked by political activists, many of whom have never organized or funded a serious campaign.

An attorney has volunteered to help the group, further meetings are planned, and various points of coordination are being established. Some areas of possible cooperation include avoidance of head-to-head competition with each other for the same elected offices, teamwork and cost-sharing

in legal actions, and pooling of volunteers for election monitoring.

Beside Len Flynn, the participants also included **Tom Blomquist**, founder of the New Jersey Conservative Party; **Bill Colucci**, Acting Chair of the New Jersey Green Party; **Mary Jo Christian**, Chair of the New Jersey Natural Law Party; **Jack McClain** of the US Taxpayers Party; and the group's coordinator, **Albert LaRotonda** of the former United We Stand.

SCHOOL BOARD MEMBERS RETURN FIRE

The Hillsborough Township (Somerset County) School Board filed a motion on January 21 to dismiss the suit of eleven local taxpayers, including NJLP members George Abramo, Patty Bartling, Sam Cipri, and Gaylord Olson. The eleven filed an opposing brief.

The motion asks that the taxpayers' complaint be dismissed for "failure to state a claim upon which relief can be granted", and asks the court to award them \$3594 in attorney fees, per New Jersey's 'Frivolous Claims Statute'. The story was covered by the *Courier News* (Bridgewater Twp.) on February 13, and by the *Hillsborough Beacon* on February 21. Both stories mentioned the "backing" of the Libertarian Party.

The suit at issue seeks recovery of the costs of drafting, printing, and distribution of a taxpayer funded 'newsletter', intended to persuade taxpayers to approve a \$53 million school construction referendum. That 'newsletter' was subsequently ruled illegal by a Superior Court Judge because it advocated 'yes' votes, rather than simply informing voters about the issue.

In the suit, the citizens invoked N.J.S. 2A:49-1 which enables ten or more taxpayers to sue "in the name of and for and on behalf of" the school district in order to recover public funds that were "paid, converted, or disposed of ... without right."

The case is scheduled to be heard in the courtroom of Judge Victor Ashrafi in Somerville on March 7.

TRASH

Heitner's frequent letters to the Editor in that paper have pointed out several salient facts of concern about this operation: its failure to pay off any principal on its nine-year-old debt of \$47 million, despite having charged three to four times the market rate for trash disposal during that period; its legally imposed monopoly on trash disposal in Sussex County; and the ultimate responsibility of Sussex County property owners for its debt, which was underwritten by the County's Freeholders. That debt currently amounts to over \$1000 for each household in the county.

Recent court rulings have overturned the New Jersey laws which gave county-owned trash facilities monopolies on garbage disposal in their respective counties, on the grounds that they are infringements of the 'interstate commerce' clause of the Constitution.

However, the same court rulings have 'stayed' the deletion of these laws until the legislature establishes a method of retiring the debt these authorities have incurred. The method the legislature is currently considering will require municipalities to raise taxes for this purpose.

KUDOS FOR ADLER

NJLP member Diane Adler's suit against her town's police chief won praise from a local columnist.

Adler, the Chair of the Libertarian Party of Somerset and Middlesex Counties (LPSMC), was praised in the *Home News and Tribune* of East Brunswick, in the column titled "On my own" by **Rick Malwitz**, which appeared on January 7.

Malwitz' angle was to compare the public reaction to Adler's stand for her Second Amendment rights with the public reaction to Larry Flynt's stand for his First Amendment rights:

"Don't tread on me, says Hollywood, which will probably reward the movie (People vs Larry Flynt) with honors this spring. Free speech uber alles

"But while the liberal mind embraces Flynt's constitutional rights, what does it do with Diane Adler's?"

Malwitz continues:

"The state law is clear. Issuance of a (gun) permit shall be made within thirty days 'Unless good cause for denial appears.'

Malwitz quotes NJLP member **George Abramo** and gun rights attorney **Evan Nappen** in the column, as he explains that many police chiefs ignore the law in this matter.

He closed the piece with this:

"...if authorities wink at this law as a matter of course, what's next?"

TO AUDITORNOT TO AUDIT-THAT IS THE QUESTION

NJLP member Mike Pierone, 40, obtained audits from the state legislature's web site and found that Essex County's Division of Welfare (ECDW) hadn't been audited since 1989, when ten million dollars was found missing. Pierone inquired to (state) Department of Human Services' 'single audit contact', Bernice Smith, and was told that Essex' records are "unauditable". Smith explained that ECDW simply doesn't keep complete records.

The state Auditor's Office told Pierone that ECDW people were getting expense checks, which they then reported lost, got replacement checks, and cashed both (or three ?or four). Pierone was told that those known to have done this were not made to return the money, and that there is no criminal investigation.

After sending an e-mail to the Governor's office, and a fax to the Attorney General's office, Pierone received a response from Bernice Smith, who is also the Director of the Office of Auditing. That reply, dated February 5, 1997, included this:

"There seems to be some confusion around the fact whether Essex County keeps records. During our conversation, I advised you that Essex County had records but they were unauditable."

The Essex County Division of Welfare hadn't been audited since 1989...about 10 million dollars turned up missing!

RETURN TO THE MIDDLE AGES

The economy of medieval Europe was dominated by craft and trade guilds which strictly regulated prices, wages, and volume of trade. These monopolistic guilds were each a combination of what we now call chambers of commerce, labor unions, insurance companies, and fraternal societies. Each claimed to establish the 'just' prices for the products or services offered by their members, and likewise dictated the terms under which employees could be hired and trained.

Another issue in which the central authority of the time obtained virtual compliance was religion. The official religion was imposed on all, and dissenters were apt to be wiped out, as the Catharists were in 1209 in Toulouse, or expelled from a kingdom, as the Jews were from England, Spain, and elsewhere throughout the middle ages.

If these circumstances sound familiar, they should; modern governments make claims very similar to those of the guilds in justifying their control of the economy, and use claims very similar to those made about Catharists and Jews to justify, say, the slaughter of dissidents like the Branch Davidians.

Both of these enforced uniformities were first abandoned in Europe in seventeenth century Holland, where a revolution in outlook took place, as described here by **Kenneth Clark**.

(Berckheyde's painting of Haarlem reflects) "the revolution that replaced divine authority by experience, experiment, and observation.

"I am in Holland not only because Dutch painting is a visible expression of this change of mind, but because Holland -economically and intellectually- was the first country to profit from the change. When one begins to ask the question 'does it work?' or even 'does it pay?' instead of, 'is it God's will?', one gets a new set of answers, and one of the first of them is this: that to try to suppress opinions which one doesn't share is much less profitable than to tolerate them."

The New Jersey Libertarian Party now has yet another reason to get New Jersey's discriminatory law forbidding voters to register as Libertarians overturned. 

SUSTAINABLE FREEDOM **COALITION**


The NJLP State Board voted at its January 19 meeting to join the Maine-based Sustainable Freedom Coalition (SFC).

A story in the January New Jersey Libertarian alluded to the ordeal NJLP member Isaac Wright has been subjected to by the idiotic "War on Drugs".

The story told that Appellate Court Judge Leonard Arnold found that the Somerset County Prosecutor extorted perjured testimony from Wright's acquaintances in exchange for immunity from prosecution or plea bargains, and suppressed evidence that would have damaged their case, all in a successful attempt to be the first prosecutors to get a conviction under New Jersey's 'Drug Kingpin Law'. The story also mentioned that Judge 'Iron Mike' Imbriani presided over the trial, before he was arrested, tried, convicted, and punished for defrauding a group of business partners.

NILP members appalled by these facts, and groping for some means of expressing their sympathy for Wright, decided to bestow an honorary membership on him, which was done at an NILP General Meeting in July of 1992.

For the future, it would be more appropriate to create an award, announcement, or endorsement dedicated to victims of government injustice than to give honorary memberships, which should go only to those with outstanding achievements.

Let's reaffirm our sympathy for Isaac Wright, but let's also find or devise some other way to express that sympathy in the future. The way government is going, we'll need to use it often. -EW

WANTTOWIN **ELECTIONS? READ** THIS.

As a candidate in two countywide races, I've seen entrenched incumbent opponents defeat challengers and be defeated. Both winners and losers had things in common, and those similarities are the basis of these suggestions on how to win elections:

1) You must start your political career by building goodwill among a sizable audience.

This might seem too obvious to mention, but I've watched several outstanding prospective candidates begin

their political careers with a campaign for an elected office, which invariably failed. People vote for those they already know, or like, or trust. If they met you when you were a dance instructor or coach in the Little League, they'll tend to trust you. If they met you during your first campaign for office, they'll tend to be suspicious.

Most election winners began their political careers with community involvement. Besides coaching the Little League or teaching ballet, this might mean sitting on a planning or zoning board, volunteering as a fireman or to help the local poor, or leading a petition drive for some popular local cause, like a new playground.

Any combination of activities that brings you into faceto-face contact with many neighbors and locals will do the trick. Ideally, you'll have done this for at least five years, and met at least half of the local homeowners, before you begin your first campaign.

2) Your first race should be a school board or town council election.

SHOW YOUR TRUE COLORS

I am writing about an article I read urging Libertarians to run as Republicans.
