## STATE COMMITTEE MEETING

On October 29, 1983 the NJLP State Committee held a meeting at John Schafer's home in Pennington, NJ. Present were Shafer, Rehmke, Flynn, Pope, Heller, Maiullo, R. Siano (for S. Siano), and Friedlander. Absent were Koch, Meinshausen, and Gesner.

John distributed a draft NJLP brochure for comment; he will get the revised version typeset for approval at the next meeting, which will be a general meeting set for 7:30 PM on December 2, 1983 with the supper club at 8:00 to follow (see insert). The Committee voted unanimously to spend up to \$100 for this typesetting.

Dick Siano informed the membership that the Republican incumbent mayor of Kingwood had withdrawn and endorsed Libertarian John Lutz for town council. Dick urged all NJLP members to help win this election, and thereby gain a two to one majority for Libertarians on the council--an unprecedented opportunity for the LP! To help this effort call Dick at 201/996-2469.

Vacancies on the Steering Committee were filled by unanimous votes for John Schafer (Chairman) and Bill George (Vice Chair) over none-of-the-above. Bill George was asked to reinstate the NJLP phone in his apartment with a \$600 annual limit for installation, monthly charges, and statewide (white pages) directory listings.

Steve Friedlander volunteered to be candidate recruitment chairman for the 1984 campaign. Interested (anti) politicians should call Steve at 201/874-8492.

The State Committee then considered arrangements for NJLP Presidential candidate Dave Bergland at the annual NJLP State Convention March 23-24, 1984. The committee unanimously passed an 8 point position statement after over an hour of discussion. The committee approved complimentary convention packages for the candidate, a chauffeur and car plus publicity and press meetings during the conven-

tion, and fundraising arrangements to assure and protect conventioneer's choices for their donations to the NJLP and the Bergland campaign.

The hard-working State Committee members adjourned their meeting at 5:30 PM, tired but very productive.

## ELECTION UPDATE

Libertarianism goes marching on! The Middlesex/Somerset County contingent is running two candidates for State Assembly in this November's election--Steve Friedlander for the 16th district and Rick Hoegberg in the 17th. Between them and their manager Danny Maiullo, many campaign hours and contributions have been solicited and poured into creating posters, leaflets, direct mailings, interviews, appearances and press releases.

Moving into the final few days, we ask for any and all further volunteers. We already have a lot of material to give out--enough posters to staple to every phone pole in the 17th district, and plenty of leaflets besides. The idea is to make the best possible showing in election results. No matter how good our message, it won't be worth a thing if it doesn't reach out to the people. Election results (factored for our relative strength) are the feedback which let us know what we're doing wrong and right.

We're hoping to find that our honed charm and persuasive powers will make serious inroads into the traditional parties, and to find out how effective we can be. After the November 8th election we'll let you know how we did.

**Metcalf Lampoons Federal Reserve Board**

Senator Jack Metcalf, representing the 10th District in the Washington State Senate has filed SB 4254, the Timber Reserve Board. It calls for a timber reserve board of 7 members, each serving 14 year terms and selected from the presidents and vice presidents of the major timber companies. It calls for them to make all decisions on timber - when and where it can be cut, at what price it can be sold. It calls for Timber Reserve Board meetings to be conducted in private, not subject to open meetings or freedom of

information laws; its records are not open for inspection and it cannot be audited. Sound familiar? Certainly! It is a parallel of the Federal Reserve Board. It is a bill filed "to make a point" and the point is being made with various members of the press and the irate citizens who call or write to say "How Dare You!" No legislator would ever vote for such a bill for the timber industry, thus pointing out clearly the fundamental fatal flaw of the Federal Reserve.
