LUCILLE BENDER FOR NJ ASSEMBLY

Long time Libertarian from Elberon, Lucille Bender, ran in a special election held on Thursday, September 15th, to fill the 11th District Assembly seat vacated by Anthony M. Villane, Jr. The other candidates were Thomas M. Villane, Republican and son of the former Assemblyman, John Villapiano, Democrat, and Independent Joshua Leinsdorf. Villapiano won in an upset with 14,476 votes to Villane's 12,162. Bender had 423 votes and Leinsdorf, 126.

Those libertarians who worked on this campaign learned a great deal and the whole party can benefit from their experience. Some towns were canvassed by volunteers going door-to-door and we need to see the comparative results in those specific areas. Lucille made a TV commercial and radio ads for this campaign. (Did you see Lucille on CBS network TV?!!)

Lucille kept herself available for all campaign activities including debates, interviews, speeches and the making of the TV and radio advertisements. Laura Stewart as Campaign Coordinator and Barbara Jones as Campaign Manager worked tirelessly for more than a month. Due to their planning and effort the campaign workers had excellent flyers to hand out and signs which were posted on lawns, store windows, and posts. A full page newspaper ad plus TV and radio ads were arranged through Laura's and Barbara's efforts.

Despite the severe time limits (only about 6 weeks) the campaign was well-organized and attracted new

Debate Offers Candidates Chance To Voice Opinion

WALL, TWP.—At a debate hosted by the League of Women Voters Sunday at Wall High School, the four candidates for the 11th District State Assembly seat recently vacated by Anthony "Doc" Villane discussed the key issues in this hotly contested campaign and identified themselves as the best qualified candidate for the position.

The candidates—Lucille Bender, Libertarian; Joshua Leinsdorf, Independent; Thomas Villane, Republican; and John A. Villapiano, Democrat—answered questions that had been previously submitted by members of the audience, and screened for pertinence by a committee of the League of Woman Voters, Ocean Township. Questions were directed towards both individual candidates or all four of the Assembly hopefuls.

The majority of the questions posed during the event dealt with issues that have been at the forefront of the campaign—automobile insurance reform, environmental issues, transportation, senior services and the proposed Coastal Commission.

Essentially, the candidates' responses to the questions paralleled their oft-stated stands on the issues.

Villane, when questioned regard-

ing his views on automobile insurance reform, strongly advocated a mandatory verbal threshold provision which would limit the right of suit in many instances. He stated that a profusion of lawsuits was largely responsible for higher insurance costs and accused Villapiano of "not being responsive to the wishes of the people" by opposing a mandatory verbal threshold. Villapiano has stated that removing a citizen's right to sue is a serious step and that the mandatory verbal threshold provision is not the correct answer.

Bender stated that astronomical insurance costs are a direct result of governmental interference and regulation of a process that should have its costs set by a free market. She stated that if the government withdrew from the insurance business and allowed free competition among the carriers, the market would find its own level, resulting in lower overall rates for consumers.

Leinsdorf, whose platform is entitled "the education solution," assailed an educational system which he stated results in students with consistently low grades below the norms for their levels. He proposed "computerizing" education, by supplying students with their own personal computers.

Bender addressed the education issue by stating that school taxes would radically decrease if schools were regulated on the community level rather than on the state level, and noted that families should be allowed to send their children to schools of their choice and receive tax credits if those schools were non-public. She also opposed federal subsidies to local schools.

Villane and Villapiano differed on Governor Kean's proposed Coastal Commission, with Leinsdorf and Bender generally siding with Villapiano.

Villane, a strong supporter of the Coastal Commission, disagreed with Villapiano's view that the agency would constitute another level of bureaucracy and remove local zoning regulations and developmental oversight from the effected communities. He stated that the commission would be, in part, composed of residents of the region and would act to "preserve the beauty of the shore."

Villapiano countered that he distrusted a commission whose members were appointed by the governor without legislative oversight. He stated that the functions of the commission would best be performed at the local level.

Bender agreed with Villapiano, and added that funding sources for the proposed \$600 commission had yet to be determined.

Following the debate, which was attended by about 125 residents and friends of the candidates, an impromptu press conference was held by Republican party officials in the school auditorium, here.

Officials of the League of Women Voters denounced the conference, stating that it compromised the non-partisan nature of the debate.

"I would like to make it very clear that the League of Women Voters does not condone this behavior," stated Marie Curtis, State vice president of the League.

NJLP MEETINGS

On August 23, 1988 the NJLP State Committee met at Farrell's Ice Cream Parlour in East Brunswick. Present were Karlan, Zeldin, Maiullo, Friedlander, Stewart, White, Swirsky, Hill, Kerr, Peters, and Shoen. Flynn, Harris, Polombo, Meinshausen, Schafer, Pierone, and Agnew were absent. (Ginny Flynn took minutes in her husband's absence.)

The meeting was called to order at 8:25 PM by State Chair Dan Karlan. Discussion began on the need/desirability of incorporation for the NJLP. Dan Maiullo explained that for reasons of limiting personal liability of party officers and because the NJLP Bylaws require it, incorporation will be pursued. About 4 years' fees at \$15/yr. will need to be submitted for our Inc. status to be renewed.

John Hill announced he had withdrawn his proposal to recruit NJLP members for a premium, as was discussed and approved by the NJLP membership at the July 3, 1988 General Meeting. The offer as outlined still applies to anyone who wishes to recruit NJLP members.

Several expenditures were approved by the State Committee during the meeting. The NJLP will purchase the "Solution" video when available at not more than \$50. This video outlines the unique libertarian proposals for South Africa's difficult political situation. The committee voted to buy 500 "Don't Waste Your Vote" pamphlets for \$40, 100 "Libertarianism in One Lesson" booklets at \$2 ea., and 200 "LP News Outreach" newspapers at \$17/100.

A copy of the NJLP mailing list will be supplied to Libertarian International for a one time only use at two cents per label. John Hill will find out the cost for mailing lists from CATO, FEE, etc. and report at a future meeting.

Chris White told the members he was considering withdrawal of his Congressional candidacy because he cannot campaign. The committee responded by passing a motion urging Chris to stay in the race. Howard Schoen discovered that his county clerk was unaware of his candidacy for Congress, so all candidates should check with their clerks and write letters requesting that their names be put on the ballot on the same line as Ron Paul.

A motion was passed to place on the agenda for the next general meeting an amendment to the NJLP Bylaws article 4 section C(2). The amendment proposes to add "The Steering Committee shall prepare a budget for the NJLP for presentation at the annual convention."

Laura Stewart noted the September 15 Special Election for the 11th District state assembly seat in eastern Monmouth County. The NJLP's candidate, Lucille Bender, needs both volunteer workers and financial support.

Dan Karlan told the group that consideration of a location for the 1989 state convention should begin now. The meeting adjourned at 9:25 PM.

On September 13, 1988 the NJLP Steering Committee held a nonmeeting due to lack of a quorum. Present were Karlan on time with Flynn, Friedlander, and Stewart late. Absent were Maiullo, Zeldin, White, and Swirsky.

Tardy members resolved to come earlier to future meetings, because Chairman Karlan had gone home after waiting alone for 45 minutes. Use of "Libertarian Time" clearly can cause some troubles.

The main discussion at the non-meeting was the success of the Bender for Assembly campaign in mobilizing NJLP activity. Steve Friedlander also described how LIBPAC was financing Lucille's and other campaigns. The group dispersed at 9:20 PM.

Should Special Election Be A "Shoo-In?"

WALL TWP.— On Thursday, September 15, voters in the 11th District, the "Coastal District," will go to the polls to elect a representative to fill the New Jersey State Assembly seat vacated by Anthony "Doc" Villane when he accepted a position in Governor Kean's cabinet.

As this "special election" is being held specifically to fill that seat, a light turnout is expected.

And counting on that fact, the well-oiled Monmouth County Republican machine has moved into high gear to "get the vote out" and ensure that Villane's 26 year old son, Tom, fills what they see as the "family seat."

It's the rare household that has not received a healthy dollup of slick Republican campaign literature in their mailbox. And considering the political make-up of this district, Tom's a "shoo-in." But, should he be?

"Here is a chance to disrupt the smug expectations of a smooth machine that runs to perpetuate its own existence."

We do not believe so. We believe that the Republican Party has drifted far from the ideals that made this country great. This party has become the vehicle of governmental over-regulation, political interference in private enterprise, and a factor in the stifling of individual achievement. This party and its candidate are "Republican" in name only.

The Democrats do not offer us much of a difference either. But, there is one candidate in this election who, although she does not use the term "Republican," offers a platform, a program and a philosophy that would gladden the hearts of the early Jeffersonians — the progenators of the "Grand Old Party."

Lucille Bender represents the kind of Republican ideals that have been all but forgotten by those who use the term.

Lucille Bender runs under the banner of the Libertarian Party. There are many of us who do not know what a Libertarian is. And that's a shame — because Libertarians are what Republicans used to be.

Libertarians believe that governmental waste and corruption is a direct result of interference in areas that are best left to the private sector. The Libertarian philosophy was espoused by Thomas Jefferson, who said "that government is best which governs least."

Bender recognizes that it was private enterprise that made this country great and private enterprise which kept it great, and that interference with that system, on every level, from the community to federal, is what is making us less than great now.

Bender will fight for local autonomy, deregulation and the abolishment of "pie-in-the-sky" programs which result in more taxation.

She will act as a guardian of the public purse because she will not have to answer to a political machine.

Bender believes that government regulation should be restricted to areas which have a direct result on the public's well being, such as law enforcement and pollution control.

Bender's voice in the Assembly will act as a check valve to the Republicans' and Democrats' answer to everything by voting more funds — our funds.

THE HERALD supports the candidacy of Lucille Bender and urges all those who think and believe that change is possible to vote for her on Thursday.

Thursday's election will probably be the last special election in this state's history. There will be a proposal on November's ballot to abolish them, as they are expensive and usually only have a light turnout. So here is a chance to make history, to make a change, and to disrupt the smug expectations of a smooth machine that runs to perpetuate its own existence.

Forum shows candidates clearly split

WALL TOWNSHIP — The Republican and Democratic candidates for the 11th District Assembly seat began yesterday's debate separated on the dais by two independent challengers, but the forum left the Democrat and Republican clearly divided over ocean pollution, auto insurance reform and housing for deinstitutionalized mental patients in Asbury Park.

While Democrat John A. Villapiano insists experience in government will be the deciding factor in Thursday's special election, Republican Thomas M. Villane says the candidates hold fundamentally different positions on a number of key issues.

Also vying for the Assembly seat — vacated in July by Anthony M. "Doc" Villane Jr., who resigned to become commissioner of the state Department of Community Affairs — are Lucille Bender, of the Libertarian Party, and Joshua Leinsdorf, running on "The Education Solution" ticket.

All four candidates participated in a forum yesterday at Wall High School sponsored by the League of Women Voters of Ocean Township.

Polls will be open Thursday from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Villapiano, 36, is a Monmouth County freeholder and a former Ocean Township councilman. Villane has not held elected office. But the 26-year-old son of "Doc" Villane says he has gained valuable political experience by managing several election campaigns, including his father's.

"The issue is one of experience," Villapiano said yesterday. "My Republican opponent's record of service is not a clear indication of commitment to his community."

"The real difference in the campaign is the issues," Villane countered. "The one thing experience hasn't taught my Democratic opponent is to listen to the people, the mood of the people."

Putting a stop to ocean pollution and protecting the state's beaches, the candidates agreed, are two of the most serious and difficult challenges facing

the Legislature. For Villane, the solutions are to be found in Gov. Kean's proposed coastal commission, an issue now before the Legislature.

But Villapiano questioned the proposed commission as a panacea to the Shore's ailments and said he was specifically concerned about how the new agency would be funded and who would appoint its commissioners.

Villapiano proposed a number of specific steps to clean the ocean: expand the role of the Marine Police and the Coast Guard; create incentives for sewerage authorities to upgrade their facilities to the most advanced form of sewage processing; and put a stop to all ocean dumping immediately.

Last month the U.S. Senate unanimously passed a bill to completely ban the dumping of sewage sludge in the ocean by 1991.

To lower the cost of auto insurance, Villane said he would support a mandatory verbal threshold, which would allow motorists to sue for pain and suffering only if seriously injured.

Villapiano, meanwhile, criticized the Legislature for moving too slowly and sporadically to lower auto insurance rates.

Ms. Bender, who calls for across-the-board tax cuts and a greatly limited role for state government, blamed the insurance crisis on Trenton.

"The reason we're paying so much money is because the government got into the insurance business, where it doesn't belong," she said.

For Villapiano, a major issue is the fate of the deinstitutionalized mental patients in Ocean Grove and Asbury Park, who stand to be displaced because of redevelopment. Villane and Leinsdorf said the root of the problem is a lack of affordable housing. But Villapiano, who oversees the county's health and social service departments, strongly disagreed.

"This is not an issue of homelessness. It's a mental illness issue," he said. "Asbury Park's become the state's dumping ground for the mentally ill."

"If there had been proper funding for the mentally ill in the state budget, we could have gotten away from this warehousing of the mentally ill."

State Libertarians reorganize for '88 Assembly elections

HOWELL — Members of the Monmouth County Libertarian Party are facing what they consider their first winnable election.

Eighteen members of the party gathered Friday night at the home of Tom and Jan Palven, Casino Drive.

Lucille Bender was nominated as their candidate for the special election to fill the state Assembly seat recently vacated by Anthony "Doc" Villane, who became commissioner of the state Department of Community Affairs.

Bender is a Long Branch resident who owns and operates the Ivy Hedge Nursery School.

According to Laura Stewart, chairwoman of Libertarians of Monmouth County,

"Bender has a good chance of winning because it's a special election; the turnout is historically low. Since it is the only assembly seat, we hope to get Libertarians from all over the state involved in the campaign. We think more people will turn out to vote for her when they learn they have a real choice. They can just say no to big government."

"We've been around for a long time, working to establish ourselves as a third political party. The going has been slow and there is a lot for us to overcome, but I'm beginning to see us getting some name recognition and people are beginning to know who we are," Stewart said.

Recent efforts to get the party greater recognition suffered a minor setback when the

Libertarians were unable to obtain a table at the Monmouth County Fair.

"We put in an application to have a table at the fair in April, but were told the table space had already been closed out in March. We're hoping to find someone who will be willing to share their table," Stewart stated.

Local members of the party also made the decision to assist the party's candidates for president and vice president; Ron Paul, a former Republican Congressman from Texas, and Andre Marrou, a former state legislator from Alaska, respectively, appear on the ballot in Connecticut.

Dan Maiullo of Freehold, the Libertarian candidate for Congress from the fourth district, was among those who drove to Connecticut to acquire signatures on a petition to have the national candidates placed on

that state's ballot.

"Since their requirements are so much greater than ours we felt we would just go up and help out," Stewart said.

"That's one of the most difficult things for the party as a national political organization. Just appearing on the ballot in some states is a challenge. New Jersey is relatively easy, particularly in comparison to many other states," she added.

For a presidential candidate to appear on the ballot in New Jersey requires a petition with 800 signatures to be filed 54 days before the primary, while in Connecticut 15,000 signatures must be filed by Aug. 12.

The Libertarians' next meeting is scheduled for Aug. 19 at the home of Seonard and Virginia Flynn, 254 Tennent Road, Morganville.

Regarding your July 29 editorial ("Edison taxes"), I appreciate the efforts of Karl Kovach to try to keep a rein on the cost of government. However, the real solution to this problem is to challenge the premise under which government costs increase every year.

It is true that people want their garbage disposed of, their streets lighted and plowed, their safety protected and their children educated. But it is not true that the government is always the best choice in providing these services. Individuals can decide for themselves where their money is best spent. This is especially true for education,

which takes the largest share of local taxes from Edison residents.

Bender, who several times emphasized the Libertarian philosophy that government be less involved in areas that can be better served by the open competition of the free market, reminded the audience that the coastal commission will cost taxpayers an estimated \$600 million.

"There's simply not enough money to go around to pay for every special interest, for every poor or homeless family," Bender said. "The government is the cause of many of these problems. They've got their hands in too many areas."
