STATE TARGETS LAWSUIT WINNERS

SUCCESSFUL CIVIL LITIGANTS MUST WAIT FOR MONEY; PROVIDE STATE WITH DATE OF BIRTH AND SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBER

TRENTON - On January 5. 1996, Governor Whitman signed Senate Bill No. 1869 into law (see L.1995, c. 334). Sponsored by Wayne Bryant (D-Camden) and Joseph Palaia (R-Deal), S-1869 prohibits successful state court litigants from receiving their monetary awards until after the state verifies that no money is owed for past due child support. The new requirement will apply to all state court judgments and settlements, including those issued by the Small Claims court. The law takes effect

settlement Upon conclusion of a civil case, the court will automatically order that no money be disbursed for a 30-day period. The court will also order the successful party to complete and file a certification containing his or her name. address, date of birth and social security number. During the next 30 days, state agencies will verify whether or not the party entitled to the award is in arrears on his or her child support payments. If so, the state will deduct the amount in arrears from the award and pay it over to the appropriate probation department. If word is not received from the state child support agencies within 30days, the successful party is entitled to receive the money. The text of the new law is set forth below. It neither

the reported information with state or federal taxing authorities. Also, it is silent on whether or not the social security number requirement violates the Federal Privacy Act of 1974.

The legislation passed both houses by unanimous votes. Wynona Lipman (D-Newark), Louis Bassano (R-Union), John Ewing (R- Bernardsville), John Adler (D-Haddonfield), James Cafiero (R- Wildwood), Andrew Ciesla (R-Toms River) and Nicholas Sacco (D-North Bergen) cosponsored the bill. The law reads as follows:

BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

- 1. a. Upon resolution of any civil action where a party is entitled to receive a monetary award or settlement, the court shall:
- (1) Require the submission of a certification which includes the full name, address, Social Security number and date of birth of the party entitled to receive

RULING ON FORFEITURE MEANS "COPS HAVE BECOME THE ROBBERS"

WASHINGTON, DC -- Private property? Thanks to the Supreme Court, it's an "endangered species" in America, warned the Libertarian Party in March.

"The Supreme Court's ruling this week on property forfeiture means the government can seize your property whenever it wants, even if you're innocent of any crime," said Steve Dasbach, Chairman of America's third largest political party.

"Cops have become the robbers with a license to steal, under this new ruling," he said.

The Supreme Court ruled on Monday that the government can seize property used to commit a crime, even if the owner was innocent of any wrongdoing.

The case involved a Michigan woman whose family car was confiscated when her husband used it for

sex with a prostitute. The Court rejected her argument that as an "innocent owner" she was entitled to compensation for her half-interest in the automobile.

"Innocence and fairness are beside the point, the chief justice [William H. Rankest] said in the ruling," the Washington Times reported.

Dasbach said Libertarians view all property forfeiture laws as unjust --"but this new ruling is an outrage, and a blatant violation of the Bill of Rights," he charged.

"This ruling obliterates the protections of the Fifth Amendment, which states that private property shall not be taken without just compensation," and demolishes the 14th Amendment, which adds neither shall any State deprive any person of life,

liberty, or property without due process of law,' " he said.

"This Supreme Court ruling shows why we need to elect Libertarians to high office -- before it's too late. Only Libertarians are committed to protecting the private property rights of all Americans," said Dasbach.

the subject On of property forfeiture. the Libertarian Party Platform states: "We condemn the wholesale confiscation of property prior to conviction by the state that all too often accompanies police raids. searches, and prosecutions for victimless crimes. We call for the repeal of antiracketeering statutes such as the Racketeer Influenced and Corrupt Organizations Act which punish (RICO), peaceful behavior by freezing and/ or seizing assets of the accused or convicted."

How "Forfeiture Fever" is spreading

- In New York, legislators have considered a law to allow local officials to confiscate "cars, boats, and planes" used in connection with any misdemeanor.
- In Georgia, FBI agents seized three Mercedes-Benzes from a businesswoman after alleging that her husband placed illegal bets on sporting events from the car phones.
- In Texas and Florida, property forfeiture now applies to any criminal activity.
- · In New Jersey, it applies to

any alleged criminal activity.

- In Massachusetts, the state can seize the assets of corporations that violate environmental laws.
- The Immigration & Naturalization Service has seized over 30,000 cars and trucks since 1990 from people helping illegal immigrants enter the U.S.
- In New Jersey, officials confiscated home office equipment from a mancharged with practicing psychiatry without a license.
- In Washington, DC, police routinely stop pedestrians and confiscate small amounts of cash and jewelry, even when no drugs are found and no charges filed.

ACTIVIST'S CORNER

This item is a description of certain public offices Libertarian are urged to seek for four reasons: 1.) to make our judicial system fairer, 2) to gain experience dealing with the public, 3) to start building credentials for Libertarians and 4) to raise the profile of our party.

Among the easiest public offices for a citizen to obtain are the judiciary volunteer panels. Since I have thoroughly enjoyed

my participation in one of them, i heartily recommend that you do the same.

There are three Community Dispute Resolution Committees CDRC) are panels of volunteers usually in threes - who meet with parties to minor dispute before municipal court judges. CDRC panelists hear bith sides of the dispute and try to coach the parties into reaching an agreement that satisfies the needs of both sides. If the parties do reach an agreement the court cas eis dismissed without invoking any laws. CDRC panels have been amazingly successful; in settling disputes such as harassment, money claims of \$200 or less, offending pets, loud noises and the like.

The second judiciary volunteer program is the Child Placement Review (CPR) committees, which review the cases of all children place outside their homes by the Division of Youth and Family Services (DYFS). CPR committees make recommendations to the judges controlling these case.

The third volunteer program is the Juvenile Conference Committees (JCC) which examine children who commit minor crimes and formulate plans of restitution and/or punishment which can be imposed by the court.

Participating in one of these panels will take a few hours in one evening each month. To join my town's CDRC, I attended five training session on evenings and weekends. I now look forward to CDRC meetings, and would cancel almost anything to make one.

All three of these programs make a solid difference in your neighborhood, all will give you experience in solving problems and forming policy and the exhilaration you'll experience when you succeed can't be gotten in any other way.

Minutes of the General Meeting, March 16, 1996

The chairman called the convention to order at 9:03 am at the Landmark Inn, Woodbridge.

The membership approved the agenda, convention rules and the minutes of the Steering Committee meeting of February 18. The treasurer's report was received.

Election of officers and atlarge representatives. The officers were re-elected, the only challengers being noneof-the-above: Flynn, chair; Wiessmann, vice chair; Ellett, and Stefanelli, secretary; treasurer. Buoncristiano and Schoen were elected members at-large.; Pfeiffer was reelected a member atlarge. Grindlinger and Quarles continue as members at-large by petition.

By-laws amendments. The chairman ruled that the inclusion of the proposed bylaws changes in the minutes previously published in the newsletter constituted proper notice to the membership. The amendments proposed Karlan will passed. incorporate them into the bylaws, and submit the revision the secretary acceptance.

Election of delegates to the national convention. New Jersey's full complement of twenty-five delegates was elected: Adler, Buoncristiano, Campbell, Ellett, Federici, Florentine, L. Flynn, V. Flynn, Giradeau. Grindlinger, Hill. Kaplan, Konek, A. Lett, L. Lett, Macron, E. Macron, Paff. Pfeiffer. Mehaffey. Quarles. Saint-Pierone. Andre, Stefanelli and Wiessmann, First alternates are Myerson and Dougerty (tied), Peters, Austin, Sims, DeBlock, Heiser, L. Eden, L. Eden and Salzano.

NJLP Platform, Based on comments previously received the membership Macron presented sixteen revisions to the draft platform. She noted that the committee had devoted hundreds of hours to its preparation. comments had be thoughtfully considered, and she proposed that the platform be voted upon in its entirety rather than piecemeal. RESOLVED, that the sentence on p.16 regarding the recognition of citizens' power of recall of elected officials be struck. FAILED. RESOLVED, that the term physician-patient relationship (*p.16, Sect. III,2,2d col., 1.6) be replaced by practionerpatient relationship. PASSED. RESOLVED that debate cease. FAILED, RESOLVED that Sect. III 8, para. 2 sent. 3-4 be reinstated: we demand the return of New Jersey's railroad system to private ownership. We call for the privatization of airports, air traffic control systems, public roads bridges and state highways. FAILED (on the grounds that it would be difficult to explain to others whether the owner of a private road could bar someone from using it to get to his property, if we hadn't thought it out ourselves.) RESOLVED, that the sentences question be reinstated without reference to public roads, bridges and state highways. FAILED. A motion to cease debated PASSED. RESOLVED, that the platform be adopted as amended. PASSED. The convention expressed its gratitude to the hard working committee members.

Approval of candidates. The convention nominated Ben Grindlinger as candidate for the

candidates for all thirteen Congressional districts: 1st Mike Edmonson: 2d, Glenn Campbell; 3d Janice Presser: 4th Bob Figueroa; 5th Dan Karlan; 6th Keith Quarles;7th Jime Kresse 8th Peter Saint-Andre: 9th Leon Myerson; 10th Roberto Carabello; 11th Austin Lett; 12th Virginia Flynn: 13th Mike Buoncristiano. The convention also approved two freeholder candidates: James Bacher, Gloucester county, and Dan Maiullo, Monmouth county; one candidate for surrogate. Joe Krimko. Monmouth county; and four municipal candidates: Lloyd Freedman, Manchester Township; Robert McGee, Dupont Town Council; Steve Nagle, Belmar Town Council; and Dino Toro, Millville Township Committee.

Presidential electors.
Fifteen electors, one for each congressional district and senatorial seat, were elected: Campbell, Buoncristiano, Ellett, Enterline, V. Flynn, Grindlinger, Kaplan, Konek, b. Macron, Myerson, Panella, Pfeiffer, Quarles, Schoen and White.

Election of trustees. Konek and Paff were elected. (They will serve with E. Macron, who was elected last year.)

Standing committee reports (Wiessman coordinator)

State House Office committee. Pfeiffer reported that the committee raised more than \$6000, \$1,100 of which has been refunded because the goal was not reached. Including a generous donation of \$250 contributed at the convention there is now \$5278 in the fund. The committee is

considering a plan to hire a part-time employee.

Fund raising (Mehaffey) See State House office committee report.

Recruitment and membership (Konek and Saint-Andre) The committee has developed a libertarian help desk concept, wherein prospects can call members who are willing to answer their question. Volunteers and a coordinator are needed.

On-going business.

Campaign support. Glen Campbell volunteered to be CATV petition coordinator. show. Ellett reported that Shad Woolley's half-hour show, A Third point of View, is available in 13-week sets for airing on public access channels. What is needed is members who are willing to get it broadcast. Lett will contact his cable company in the Chatham Township area. NJLP newsletter. The March issue is ready. Please submit articles and letters to the editor, Paula brown.

Tax protest day. The party has purchased 10,000 million dollar bills for distribution at post offices, Operation Politically homeless booths etc.

Report from the National party. Karlan reported that NJ and PA have between them 10% the national of membership, enough to form a NATCOM region without DE and MD, who along with NJ and PA presently constitute Region IV. PA is the second state the other being CA, to exceed 1000 members: the 1000th member is Irv Homer, the Delaware Valley radio personality.
