NJLP Candidate featured on National Front Page


The NJLP candidate for Congress in the 13th district, Mike Buoncristiano, was featured on the front page of the July Libertarian Party newsletter.


Somerset/Middlesex Libertarians score more headlines

A June 17 story in the HOME NEWS AND TRIBUNE of East Brunswick detailed a proposal made by the LP of Somerset and Middlesex, currently under consideration by the Franklin Twp (Somerset) committee, which would require attorneys applying for government work in the township to waive the confidentiality that attorneys' disciplinary records enjoy.

An editorial in the same paper on June 18 lauded the idea and gave full credit to the local Libertarians -led by Diane Adler and John Paff- who proposed it. The editorial ended: "If Franklin approves this landmark ordinance, it should be a model to other municipalities,"

Embarrassed Libertarian speaks out

Editor:

Recently I received the April/May/June NEW JERSEY LIBERTARIAN. Since I have been in the publication business all my life, I feel qualified to offer a few comments.

The picture on the front page has, as far as I can tell, NOTHING to do with the accompanying story. The story begins "On January5...", not exactly HOT news. The story on page one also stops dead in its tracks in the middle of a sentence. Whaaa?

The "Activist's Corner" column on page 3 is, frankly, embarrassing. Throughout, the tone is sluggish and unconvincing. That is forgivable. But numerous other errors are childish and, as I said, embarrassing to me as a Libertarian, not to mention as an intelligent human being with something above a third grade reading level. To wit: i for I; bith for both; case is for case is; etc.

Egregious errors such as subject and verb not agreeing, e.g.: "CPR committees make recommendations to the judges controlling these case.", "which review the cases of children place outside their homes..." On and on. How can these errors pass even the most cursory editorial review? Which reminds me: does an editorial review exist? This letter is addressed to the editor of the newsletter, but no such editor is identified. Why?

Also: syntactic parallelism seems to be a concept with which the "activist" author is unacquainted; see the column's final, divergent, roller coaster paragraph.

Additionally, I question several of the author's assertions.

Such as item number 3 in the first paragraph: that a reason to seek public office is to "start building credentials for Libertarians" I thought we "started" doing this twenty years ago. Maybe the author means EXPAND Libertarian credentials?

On a basic philosophical premise, my concept of Libertarianism does not in any way endorse or sanction programs such as the "Child Placement Review Committee". What's next, the Adult Placement Review Committee? ABSURD. I am astounded that a Libertarian newsletter recommends participation in such condescending "big brotherish" programs, although I must admit that we do seem to need an Adult Literacy Review Committee.

BOB FIGUEROA IN JAIL

Bob Figueroa, the NJLP candidate for U.S. Congress in District 4 was found "in contempt" of court on Monday July 8 by Trenton municipal court Judge Audrey Blackburn and sentenced to 30 days in jail. He was in court to be arraigned on the charge of "harassment" of two Mercer County judges arising from letters he sent to them complaining about their handling of his divorce case. According to a court watcher group (People Against Corruption and Tyranny, PACT in Orange, NJ[201/678-7195]), Bob's wife gained sole custody of their three children in an April Family Court hearing in which the judge permitted her to move to Florida WITHOUT A HEARING NOR AN INVESTIGATION as to why the children should be allowed to leave the state at all.


The "harassment" charge is a petty disorderly persons offense with minimal bail (\$500). According to a 7/9/96 Trentonian article Bob's letters contained "wording" from "writings of America's new militia movement, which argues judges routinely overstep their bounds to violate peoples's Constitutional rights." Editorial

There are roughly 500 elected public offices in the USA for each current dues paying member of the Libertarian Party, so it's no surprise that we have always had a dilemma in deciding which offices our candidates should seek. Higher offices like Senate and House, Governor and Legislature have the advantage of getting our party's name on every ballot in large areas, putting all voters on notice that our party exists and giving all of them the chance to endorse us, but not much else. lower level races like township committee, school board, etc. bring the cost and scope of the race down to a level at which we can effectively compete, and make our candidate a credible alternative to voters, but leave huge gaps between voter blocs, with many voters offered no Libertarian candidates.

Which level should you run at? President or precinct council seat? The answer depends on what you are trying to accomplish. The candidates for higher level office are educating those who will listen about what we stand for, but it seems that almost everyone willing to listen has already done so. In order to get a wider audience, we need more credibility as viable contenders, and only more election victories can give us that.

Election victories for Libertarians are likely only at the local level for at least the next two years, so it's time to focus on winnable local races, even if it means neglecting some higher offices we've traditionally fielded candidates for. This strategy seems especially promising for the NJLP, which now has many members with experience at running credible local campaigns. Austin Lett came up only a few percentage points short of victory in his township committee race in 1995. What do you think?

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three delegates, six alternates and one National Committee member from New Jersey attended. Gavel-to-gavel C-SPAN coverage gave viewers nationwide at least a glimpse of nearly all of the 605delegates at some point during three days of almost uninterrupted live coverage and reruns of each day's highlights.

Veteran NJLP member Ken Kaplan said that the convention was the most professional and impressive spectacle the Libertarian Party has staged to date, and noone has contradicted him. Indeed, both the WASHINGTON POST and WASHINGTON TIMES ran feature stories about the nomination of LP Presidential Candidate Harry Browne and Vice Presidential Candidate Jo Jorgensen. The Associated Press issued a story about the convention which ran in many New Jersey Papers on Sunday July 7, and WASHINGTON POST columnist David Broder followed up with a column in many papers which the STAR-LEDGER entitled "On-line Libertarians have edge on old-line parties". The POST story included a photo of New Jersey delegate Ed Wiessmann.

On July 11, taxpayer supported channel 13 aired an interview with Harry Browne, and the Browne campaign kicked off a radio ad campaign in the Metro Washington DC area on Monday July 8. The WASHINGTON TIMES even ran a story about candidate for LP national Chair Gene Cisewski.
