

## Chair's Message

We all know Libertarianism is a philosophy of freedom, asserting that individuals own their lives, choices, and property, free from state coercion. Its roots span Western thought, culminating in the modern movement we know today. But do you know the very founders of our party? One such founder was David Nolan, a founder of the Libertarian Party, shaped its U.S. story, a legacy that inspires libertarians nationwide to defend liberty's flame to this very day.



David is a pivotal figure in modern American libertarianism. Born in 1943 in Washington, D.C., Nolan was shaped by the individualist fiction of Robert Heinlein and Ayn Rand, whose works fueled his political awakening at MIT. By the late 1960s, as a member of Young Americans for Freedom (YAF), he witnessed the conservative movement's clash with emerging libertarian radicals.

Disillusioned by Richard Nixon's 1971 wage and price controls, the end of the gold standard, and the Vietnam War's overreach—all of which he deemed

unconstitutional or immoral—Nolan acted. On December 11, 1971, in a Colorado Springs meeting sparked by discussions in his Westminster living room, he co-founded the Libertarian Party with a handful of like-minded activists. Libertarianism was born (and thankfully never aborted).

Nolan envisioned the Libertarian Party as a radical voice, not a vote-chasing machine. He defined a “real libertarian” by five uncompromising principles: self-ownership, the right to self-defense, opposition to “criminal possession” laws, rejection of income taxes, and support for sound money. These ideas, he argued, would dismantle the state's coercive apparatus, fostering a society of voluntary cooperation.

David Nolan's Chart, created in 1969 and published in 1971, redefines political ideology with two axes: economic freedom and personal freedom. Economic freedom, on the vertical axis, spans individual control over wealth versus government regulation. Personal freedom, on the horizontal, covers autonomy in lifestyle versus state restrictions.

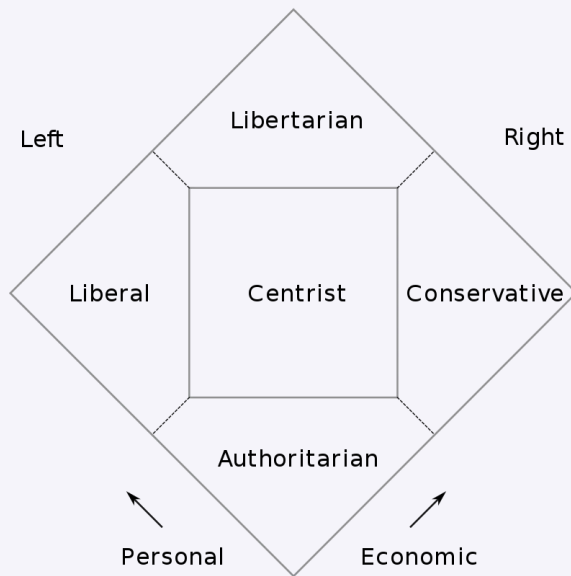
Libertarians score high on both, in the top-right quadrant, favoring free markets and free speech. Conservatives, bottom-right, prefer economic liberty but social limits. Liberals, top-left, value personal freedom but economic controls. Authoritarians, bottom-left, restrict both.

Centrists sit in the middle. Nolan’s chart, popularized as the “World’s Smallest Political Quiz,” highlights libertarianism’s distinct stance.



Nolan, until his 2010 death, watched the Libertarian Party’s zeal erode, dismayed by its sway toward pragmatism. After the 2006 platform “reform” stripped its radical edge for electoral appeal, he told Lew Rockwell in 2008, “They’re afraid to say anything that might scare people—they’ve traded liberty’s bold truth for timid votes.” He saw both major parties entrenching authoritarianism—one economic, one social—and warned of statism’s creep. In 2009, he backed the New Hampshire Free State Project as a liberty bastion, fearing a movement softening its voice risked losing its soul. His call was clear: without courage, libertarianism would fade.

In New Jersey, we are choked by taxes, rules, regulations, fees, woke ideology, an education system gone awry, and an extremely burdening bureaucracy. Here, in the garden state, Nolan’s vision resonates with us. His chart guides us to reject false choices, his warnings to shun compromise.

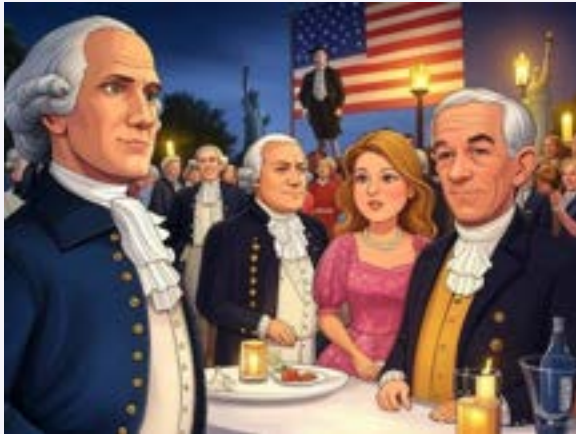
From Defend the Guard, Medical Freedom, and reducing spending, libertarians must wield his radical spirit against Trenton’s overreach. Libertarianism’s heritage, refined through struggle, demands courage and action. Let’s make New Jersey a stronghold, true to Nolan’s legacy and the ideals of liberty, Freedom, and Peace.

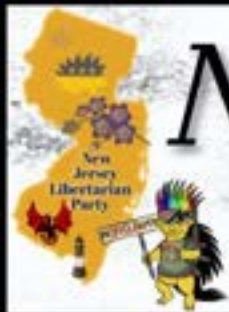

Some of the credit also is due **Angela McArdle**, and—by extension—the hundreds and hundreds of you who, as Mises Caucus supporters and activists, ensured her election as LNC chair in 2022 and her re-election earlier this year.

Instead of following the Gary Johnson/Jo Jorgensen template of focusing on expensive presidential campaigns that offer neither political success in the short term or party growth in the long term, Angela chose to leverage our power as a

small voting bloc and got President Trump to promise to pardon Ross Ulbricht in exchange for time on stage at the Libertarian National Convention.

Not an endorsement, or a promise not to put the LP candidate on the ballot in certain states, just time on stage (which, incidentally, helped make the convention a financial success).

That's a deal Trump himself would have a hard time pulling off.

Helping free Ross is tangible evidence that the broad strategic vision we've been building has already begun to work, and it should motivate us to continue the Mises Caucus mission of:

- promoting bold libertarian messaging

## WHY IT MATTERS



### THE TRUE MEANING OF THE 14<sup>TH</sup> AMENDMENT

Someone I respect told me recently that we need more citizens. That was this person's (I'll use HE to mask who it is) justification for the current understanding of Art. 1, Sec. 1 of the Fourteenth Amendment. He also intimated that because of the degree they hold, they know more than I do. That being said, I don't care about college degrees. I don't care about law school degrees. I also don't care if a person is a judge or a member of the Supreme Court. I care

about lucid and fact-based arguments with substantiated data. One other thing this person said was that we need more citizens. I'll address that at the end.

AXIOM: When deciding what a law or a constitution means, you must consider the time in which it was penned. Even a law that seems to say one thing may mean something entirely different if you read it with a modern lexicon and understanding.

The Fourteenth Amendment does not confer birthright citizenship on anyone born on American soil. The concept of *Jus Soil*, the concept that declared all those born in a land citizens of that land, was repudiated by the Fourteenth Amendment.

The relevant clause of the Fourteenth Amendment reads, Section 2: "*All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States and of the State wherein they reside.*" Everyone focuses on the first and last clauses, but they ignore the middle clause or worse, misinterpret it. According to the interpretation of the clause at its writing, only citizens of the United States (natural or naturalized) may bestow citizenship upon their children at birth.

The Civil Rights Act of 1866 said it more plainly: "That all persons born in the United States and not subject to any

foreign power, excluding Indians not taxed, are hereby declared to be citizens of the United States; and such citizens, of every race and color, without regard to any previous condition of slavery or involuntary servitude..."

This law was promulgated in response to the abominable Dred Scott (1857) decision. I feel that most would be at least aware of the opinion in Dred Scott, so I won't go into it at length here other than to say that it was the opinion of the Court that blacks could never be citizens of the United States. Considering the vagaries of the period, the Republicans in Congress felt that the Act was insufficient to protect newly emancipated slaves.

With all that, the Fourteenth tends to muddy the waters. Instead of parroting the wording of the Civil Rights Act of 1866, it altered it. Clause 1, Section 1 reads: "All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States and of the State wherein they reside." Though the wording of the relevant clause are not exact in verbiage, they mean the same thing. "*Subject To the Jurisdiction*" does not reference territorial jurisdiction, in other words subject to the laws of the land; it means that they owe their primary allegiance to their home country. The Fourteenth Amendment was promulgated to protect formerly enslaved Africans and to confer

citizenship upon them, repudiating Dred Scott.

Many will point to the Supreme Court Decision in **United States v. Wong Kim Ark** (1898) which established that a child born in the United States to parents of Chinese descent, who were subjects of the Emperor of China but had a permanent domicile and residence in the United States, automatically became a U.S. citizen at birth. Though some might think this case was significant to the issue, the opinion in *Wong Kim Ark* was wrong. Just because *Wong Kim Ark* was born in America to parents who were permanent residents, they were not American citizens, either by birth or naturalization. Therefore, *Kim Ark* was not entitled to American citizenship. His parents (who returned to China with their son) owed their allegiance to China, not the United States. When *Kim Ark* attempted to return to the United States, the officials determined rightly that he was not an American citizen. His parents were always subject to the jurisdiction of the Chinese Emperor as they were never naturalized Americans (as a side note, it was not until 1943 that Chinese were allowed to become citizens). When they were here, they were subject to territorial jurisdiction, but that is not what the Fourteenth Amendment referenced in the jurisdiction clause.

In essence, the Fourteenth Amendment was designed to confer citizenship on

previously enslaved Africans, not on foreign immigrants who violated our borders and our laws by coming here to make their children citizens.

As for my friend's assertion that we need more citizens, which means nothing in terms of this argument, yes, we do. But we need citizens who are willing to follow the rules to get here and establish themselves as Americans. His claim means nothing in terms of the meaning of the Fourteenth Amendment. The Amendment means that only the children of American citizens can bestow birthright citizenship upon their children.

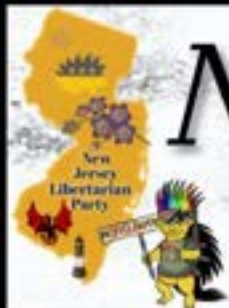

## The Unfinished War on Crypto

The past two weeks have been nothing short of surreal. If you've been following my journey over the last two and a half years, you know I've devoted my entire life to warning about the impending threat of Central Bank Digital Currencies (CBDCs) and the government's growing crackdown on cryptocurrency. So, when President Trump took three steps that seemed like a direct answer to everything I've been fighting for—pardoning Ross Ulbricht, banning any pursuit of a US CBDC, and rescinding Biden's Executive Order (EO) 14067—you'd think I'd be on top of the world.

Oddly enough, I wasn't. Instead of joy, I felt numb.

I've been grappling with why I reacted that way. At first, I chalked it up to having fought (and lost) so many battles with the government that I might be in shock or dealing with a sort of PTSD. I've known

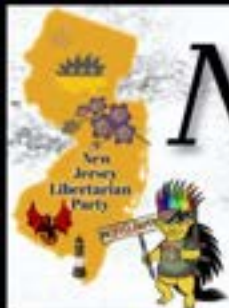
dark times—divorce, years of lawfare—and I've learned that recovery often involves facing hard truths, forgiving the people who hurt you, and then, hardest of all, forgiving yourself. Eventually, you replace anger or sadness with acceptance, and the pain recedes, leaving you wiser.

However, this isn't so simple or straightforward because while Trump's move to rescind EO 14067 was a huge step, the brutal "lawfare" unleashed by that order continues. Dozens of companies and individuals in the crypto community are bleeding out over legal fees and business losses, and some even face life-altering prison sentences. It's hard to celebrate when so many are still trapped under the very machinery, we were all fighting.

I believe that if the public—and President Trump—truly understood the devastation this crackdown has caused, they'd demand real justice. Until that happens, I can't fully let myself believe that "This time it's different." Real change means freeing the people still caught in the crosshairs of a war that should never have been waged in the first place.

### Background

In 2009, I watched my second company—a thriving healthcare venture—collapse under the weight of federal policies like Obamacare, Dodd-Frank, and Attorney General Eric Holder's prosecutorial

overreach. I wasn't singled out for destruction; I was just a speck of "collateral damage" in the government's relentless expansion. For years, I'd been told, "The pendulum always swings," but I never saw it swing back. Instead, the debt kept ballooning, the dollar kept losing value, and the perpetual wars continued. The biggest disappointment came from Republicans who not only refused to repeal Obamacare but actually expanded it through Medicaid on the state level.

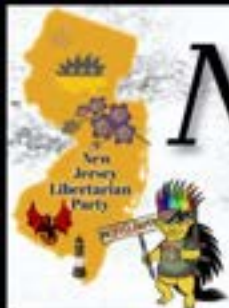
Desperate to spark change, I became a political activist. I ran organizations that recruited liberty-minded candidates for state and federal races and even threw my own hat into the ring. By 2018, though, I'd lost all faith in traditional politics—it never seemed to slow the growth of government. So I turned my gaze to what I believed could actually tip the balance for individual freedom: cryptocurrency and blockchain. Since first hearing about Bitcoin in 2012, I've seen how decentralized money could undermine central bank tyranny and fuel economic liberty worldwide. The more I studied, the more I realized that this technology could weed out useless middlemen in everything from stock trades to supply chains to real estate titles.

After Covid hit, something even darker surfaced. I began noticing a concerted federal effort to target businesses and individuals precisely at the intersection of crypto and libertarianism. Many of these

people were close friends from my days chairing the Free State Project or folks who attended events like Liberty Forum and Porcfest. Jeremy Kauffman built LBRY (also known as Odysee)—a censorship-resistant YouTube alternative—only to have the SEC hound him for five years, effectively destroying his business (though the tech still survives). Ian Freeman and the Crypto Six got ensnared in a sprawling government sting for operating Bitcoin ATMs, involving moles and entrapment by multiple agencies.

Alarmed, I started digging. I'm not blind to bad actors in crypto, but these were folks promoting free speech platforms and peaceful economic interactions—hardly criminal masterminds. Eventually, I discovered [Biden's Executive Order 14067](#), signed March 9, 2022. Its dual purpose was unmistakable: speed up a US CBDC and launch an all-out governmental assault on cryptocurrency. With the brutal crackdown in full swing—and other countries racing to introduce CBDCs—I knew I had to sound the alarm. I wrote a book, [The Final Countdown: Crypto, Gold, Silver, and the People's Last Stand Against CBDC Tyranny](#), laying it all out. I also entered the Republican Presidential primary hoping to be able to use the platform to inform the public and other candidates.

I first met Vivek Ramaswamy on the campaign trail in New Hampshire and handed him a copy of my book. To my

astonishment, not only did he read it, but over the next few months, we delved into its contents in multiple, in-depth conversations. Because my sole mission in running for president was to spotlight the looming threat of CBDCs, and because Vivek seemed to “get it” better than anyone else, I proposed dropping out and endorsing him—on one condition: he had to sign my anti-CBDC pledge.

You have to understand that New Hampshire is special. Home to the Free State Project, it boasts a massive, tight-knit liberty community. In a previous statewide race, I’d earned nearly 18,000 votes. My support might carry at least a little weight in what was shaping up to be a razor-thin—and critically important—primary. Although Vivek ended his campaign before we could finalize the pledge and endorsement, he did urge Trump to denounce CBDCs right before the New Hampshire vote. That one move underlines just how strong the liberty movement’s influence is here in the Granite State. I am grateful to Vivek for this, as Trump explicitly credited Vivek for informing him on this important issue. This was on July the 4th, 2023. Much to my surprise, Vivek had actually read my book, and we had discussed it.

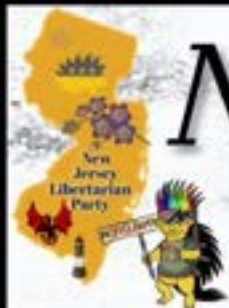
Trump announced that he was anti-CBDC in New Hampshire right before the primary

After I stepped away from the race, we embarked on a nationwide (and

eventually global) tour to warn people about the looming dangers of CBDCs and to demonstrate how to thrive using alternative currencies like gold, silver, and privacy-based cryptos (Zano, Monero, etc.). I’ve personally gone without a bank account since 2019—a one-man act of resistance against the rising surveillance state. To me, the ultimate way to stop technocracy is to use private, non-state-controlled money.

We can’t afford to be complacent. What might look like a victory could be nothing but a semantic sleight of hand. That’s why I want to dive into the real impact of Biden’s now-rescinded Executive Order 14067, how it unleashed a wave of “lawfare” that’s still ruining lives, and why simply striking it from the books hasn’t made those repercussions disappear.

This battle for financial freedom has found an unexpected ally in President Trump, who understands firsthand the weaponization of government power.
