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ELECTION RESULTS

The Libertarian Party was greatly encouraged by its candidates showing in the presidential election.

John Hospers and Tonie Nathan carried only one state less than the Democrats, and did so at considerably less expense and embarrassment. Also promising for libertarians was the lack of enthusiasm for either major party candidate, as people seemed to be looking for someplace to go politically.

NJLP has written to the New Jersey State Department to determine Hosper's vote total in the state. When (if) we receive the information, we'll pass it along. We do have the results of a mock election at South Plainfield High School, which included speeches by stand-ins for the candidates (David Barg represented Hospers). Results: Nixon - 240, McGovern - 78, Hospers - 51. After a single exposure, 14% of the young voters opted for the libertarian candidate!

Another hopeful sign; the transportation bond issue was decisively defeated. And this in a state which has a bad habit of regularly approving these economic obscenities. Perhaps after being bludgeoned about the pocketbook for many years, the taxpayer has had enough.

Now that the '72 elections are over, it's time, right now, to start planning for the 1973 gubernatorial campaign. 
Anyway, when your power goes off, remember the ocean will still be a lovely place- for fish.
